



"We have many parts in the one body, and all these parts have different functions. In the same way, though we are many, we are one body in union with Christ, and we are all joined to each other as different parts of one body." Romans 12:4,5

These familiar verses have taken on more meaning for me as I have worked with a group of Dementia Enablers to set up an ecumenical Tea Service in Barrow. There are two Church of England ladies, Babs Lowes and Julie Jones, both from St Paul's, Sue Millard from Trinity and to begin with Anne Stevenson from Ramsden Street and then later Karen Edmondson

from Vickerstown. So the Tea Service has been set up by Anglican, URC and Methodist members, and planned speakers for the monthly services include people from those traditions and also the Salvation Army and the Baptist church. To complete the picture, the services are to be held in Holy Family Roman Catholic Church.

This wide spread of churches particularly struck me when Sue and I attended the Tea Service at Kendal Parish Church on Maundy Thursday. This is organised by Anglicans, although people from other denominations are welcome. Although this works for them, Sue and I both felt quite strongly that the involvement of a number of churches in Barrow was the right way forward. It has been more complicated than just having to deal with a single denomination, and it has been far more time-consuming than any of us anticipated when we began, but I think we have all learned from each other in this practical experiment in ecumenism.

Of course, our United Area is an example of how churches can come together, and it has been heartening to read in church reports for Newslink how many of our Area churches have been able to work with members of other denominations in their communities. The recent commissioning service for the Barrow Mission Community marked an important stage in the gradual growing together of churches in the town. "All of you are Christ's body, and each one is a part of it." 1 Corinthians 12:27



I was very struck by the logo used for the Kendal Tea Service, which is reproduced here, with thanks to our Kendal friends. You may not get the full effect, but I hope it will be clear enough for you to understand my comments. The logo shows a number of hands arranged to form the shape of a cross, with a background that is partly dark but also contains a shining light that flows through the empty cross shape. The more I look at that image the more I can see in it. Ten hands are needed to make the cross shape, different sizes and colours and all coming from different directions, but working together to show an image of the faith that we all share. The shape is defined mostly by the thumb and forefinger of each hand. The forefinger is the pointing finger, reminding us that we should point people to Jesus. The fingers and thumbs don't meet completely all round the cross, so there are small gaps; the light of God's love and presence cannot be contained, even should we wish to do so.

As a group of Dementia Enablers we have felt that God has been in all our deliberations and has guided us in the way He wants us to go, so it is fitting that the Barrow Tea Service will be launched the day after Pentecost.

Tea Service

The first Barrow Tea Service will be held at 2 pm on Monday 10th June at Holy Family Church hall (Ostley Bank, off Harrel Lane). Each church in Barrow and Dalton should by now have received an information pack with a poster, fliers and details about the service and the ways in which people can help. The following is part of the information sent out.

"A Tea Service is a short, simple, interdenominational act of worship, followed by biscuits, cake, tea, coffee and fellowship. It will be open to anyone, but be particularly suitable for people who find full length services difficult to deal with, and their carers. We would really appreciate your prayers; we would also really appreciate help, where possible, from those who are willing and able to offer their time by attending the Tea Service, to welcome and to talk to people. For those able to offer their time, this doesn't necessarily need to be for every month. If you could commit to three or four services a year that would be most welcome. We would also welcome any offers to bake cakes or scones for the Tea Service; and, in order to set up the Tea Service, we need to buy resources such as special hymn books, printing publicity material, refreshments, etc. Thus, any financial help towards the £500 needed to set up and run the Tea Service would be greatly appreciated."

Green Tip

A reminder from The Sunday Mirror magazine about what we can do to help to halt the decline in the bee population. Plant lavender, buddleia and sedum to attract bees to the garden.

Leave some weeds. Dandelions are a good source of food for bees.

Put out a small water basin for bees to drink from. Add a few stones and floating objects, such as corks, so that the bees don't drown.
