



# Life in the flesh v Life in the Spirit Some years ago the late John Stott, Rector of All Souls, Langham Place, London and chaplain to the Queen for some 31 years, was asked if he believed all scripture was inspired by God. He replied that he did and then after a short pause added somewhat tongue in cheek, "but some is more inspiring than others". He subsequently went on to write "The Message of Romans" - the letter of Paul which has been described as the "gateway to Heaven".

Amongst all the letters that Paul wrote

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Romans gives the most complete picture of the gospel - the fullest and grandest in the New Testament with themes of justification, sanctification and glorification. Indeed it was the message of Romans through which John Wesley found his heart "strangely warmed" and it is the opening of Romans 8 which inspired Charles Wesley shortly after his own conversion on May 21st 1738 (and just before John's later that same week on the 24th) to write "And can it be" with its final verse, *No condemnation now I dread, Jesus and all in him is mine.* 

(There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. Romans 8:1 King James version.)

In Romans 8 Paul was writing very much from his own experience to a group of relatively new Christians in Rome, who he had never met but hoped

one day to visit, to encourage them to live life in the power of the Holy Spirit rather than in the power of the flesh (our sinful or lower nature). Quite simply, he is reminding them that those who walk daily with Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit have the inner peace of knowing that their sins have been paid for through Christ's death and resurrection and that they are no longer slaves to sin. The key is in walking daily. Each day he argues believers have a choice in how they live after they have accepted Christ into their lives. They can set their minds on the temptations of this world or they can set their minds and hearts on being led by the Holy Spirit and live according to God's will. For those who were in the Guides or the Scouts or who have done the Duke of Edinburgh's Award you will recognize the context of the word "set" as in setting a compass bearing, and in this sense Paul's teaching to the Romans on how his life has been changed from living in the flesh to living in the Spirit is as relevant today as it was 2000 years ago in Rome.

As we move forward into Lent and reflect on how Christ was led by God's Spirit but also tempted at all points I would invite you to set your compass daily on "things above" not only in your mind but also in your hearts so that with Charles Wesley you can sing -

No condemnation now I dread;
Jesus and all in Him, is mine!
Alive in Him, my living Head,
And clothed in righteousness Divine,
Bold I approach the eternal throne,
And claim the crown through Christ my own.

## **Team Ministry Update**

You will recall that the Trustees introduced a team ministry approach to the way we work in order to provide more specialised support for our churches. Thanks to all who responded to requests from the teams for the information needed as a starting point. This is to update you on what's been achieved so far, and to remind you of the support available as you seek to develop the mission and discipleship of our churches.

Mission team - all churches have participated in an act of worship with mission as its theme. It's worth restating that there is no expectation that churches will suddenly establish lots of new mission-shaped initiatives. What the discussions round those services did reveal is that our churches have lots of opportunities to give what they are already doing a more missional focus. We need to ask ourselves of each activity 'Why are we doing this?' and 'How can we build closer relationships with those who participate?' It's by building relationships that we find openings to share our personal

faith story. To explore how you and your church can be more mission focused, contact

Resources team - this is not surprisingly the busiest of the teams! They are keeping track of the on-line returns that need to be completed by our Methodist churches, and have undertaken the annual manse checks as well as looking after our other Area property. Lynne is busy working on our Area budget for 2020-21. If you have reliable tradespeople you can recommend, remember to let Karen know so she can keep a list. Worship and teaching team - the information provided by the churches about any resources they hold is being collated and will be circulated. It's good to know that most of our churches are exploring different types of worship. We have run the first level of worship leader training, with seven participants who are currently pondering whether they wish to move on to Level 2. In the light of what's said above about sharing our faith story - something we often lack the confidence to do - we would want to encourage all churches, if they haven't already done so, to consider running the 'Talking Jesus' study material - which incidentally is the recommended Lent course for the Barrow Mission Community. I have received word from Warrington that Action for Children has lost the contract for delivering services in Barrow, as from the beginning of the year. Another provider has been chosen, probably with a lower tender, as has happened before - however, can they provide the care, knowledge and experience?

Action for Children has been working in Barrow for numerous years and it is a matter of regret that another provider has taken over. However AfC were successful in their bid with South Lakes and are now working with 0-19 year olds in the area. There are 7 sites, 2 in Kendal and 1 each in Sedbergh, Windermere, Ambleside, Ulverston and Milnthorpe.

So even though no funding will go into Barrow there is still a huge need in the rest of the country, especially with today's social issues. A big THANK YOU goes to all our supporters who have collected and given over the years. Those of you who have Collecting Boxes and would now like to support a local charity please give me a ring on 716640; however, I do enjoy our time together when I collect your boxes once a year.

The staff in Barrow hopefully will stay in post. Please remember the staff, families and young people in your prayers in this time of change in their lives.

## **Youth Spot**

Since my report last year Beacon Hill Cubs have been very busy. Our Summer Term was focused on the 'Local Knowledge Badge'. The Mayor and Mayoress of Barrow came to visit our Cub Pack and we must have impressed them as they invited us to visit them at the Town Hall. What an impressive building. The Cubs learnt about our Barrow Coat of Arms and how it originated from the steelworks and shipbuilding industries and also the major landowners. To continue our theme, we did a walk along Abbey Road, taking notes of the year dates on various buildings, which indicated how Barrow expanded from the Library to our home in Newbarns.

During the term we had our Group Camp with our Beavers and Scouts at Urswick. The theme was backwoods cooking. All the children had to make fires and let them die down so they could cook their pasta (in a pan) and also toast their ham and cheese sandwiches (they were wrapped in foil!) in the embers. This was washed down with a cup of hot chocolate. It was very yummy! Not to be outdone, the leaders made chocolate eclairs from the croissant dough you can buy and a broom handle! We filled them with squirty cream and Nutella. Not sure who enjoyed these more, the children or adults. We had a great time at camp with night hikes, wide games in the woods and a good old camp fire with songs (not forgetting toasting our marshmallows!).

After the summer holidays we came back to Cubs with a fun-filled programme. We had a County Beaver and Cub Challenge Day at Penrith, where 550 children attended. Our Cubs tried out the climbing wall and also the Cave Bus (Yes, a coach stripped out and constructed as a cave which you had to crawl down, up and along!). In October we went on a night hike from Morrisons along the docks and back for a sleepover at the Church Hall. This was the first time a few of our Cubs had slept away from home, so it was exciting for them. We completed our International Badge by learning about India. We had a visit from an Indian family who came dressed in saris and told us about their country. They also fetched their currency so we could compare it to our coins and notes. We did some Indian cooking - making a paneer curry, samosa, saag aloo and a mango drink too. We finished our badge off with making Diwali lamps from clay.

## **Askam**

It is difficult to believe that we are already approaching the end of the first quarter of a new year - it only seems last week that we were preparing for Christmas and yet we have already received our new preaching plan up to Pentecost! On the first Sunday in February we had our Candlemas service and were reminded that this is a halfway point in the church year between Christmas and Easter. Yet all too often we tend to look back in church and give too little time to looking forward. ## **Green Tip**

Did you know that, according to Water UK, around 93% of blockages in UK sewers are caused by wet wipes? They then slowly break down into microplastics that cause harm to marine life.

The government's 25-year environment plan aims to eliminate all avoidable plastic waste by the end of 2042, but you can act now to replace wet wipes with an environmentally friendly alternative.

If you use wet wipes to remove makeup, try Face Halo, available from Boots and other shops for £7. The special microfibres remove makeup using only water - this really does work! You then wash it with soap after each use and machine wash up to 200 times before it needs replacing.

It is estimated that the Face Halo can take

the place of 500 traditional makeup wipes.

Or you could try Holland & Barrett's reusable organic cotton pads (part of their Zero Waste range, £8 for 6) which can be used with micellar water or facial cleansers and are said to last for years.
