



Time to Change!! Ourselves and our ideas about 'Church'

Another time of Lent is behind us. We have travelled through the desert with Jesus, recalled again the darkness of Good Friday and celebrated the joy of Easter Sunday. This is a pilgrimage we do each year as Christians; we do not even have to leave our homes to travel this journey. We do however need to make time and space, we do need to be open to listening afresh, we do need to be prepared to be changed. So then what, if anything, has made this Lent different? What changes have

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happened within us? How have we grown closer to God? Have we stopped saying and doing those things that hurt others and Jesus? The reason for asking these questions is because the marks of a good disciple are the willingness to change, the desire to die to our sinful ways and to seek to be the best we can be for Jesus. One of the readings we had during Lent was Mark 13:1-9 and it spoke very clearly to me about the need for us to be growing and changing. The message here in Mark's gospel is very clear - if we are not producing the right fruit then we will be cut down. If our lives are not changing and we are not producing the fruits of the Spirit then we do need to be asking ourselves why that is so. If coming to Church every Sunday isn't changing the way we behave then we need to really start thinking about the consequences of this!

We live in uncertain times; our church attendance numbers may be down and yet

the opportunities for engagement in community are growing. Have you ever wondered why this is? This doesn't frighten me, but rather it stirs my spirit within. I wonder at what God is doing. Why is the Spirit moving in this way? Maybe it is time for us all to take a long look at what we call 'church' in our communities and ask ourselves the following questions: what will the Methodist church look like in my community in ten/fifteen years' time? And what is God asking me to do in all this?

Whilst change can be painful, it can also be very beautiful. Sometimes things have to die within and around us in order for new growth to begin. Are we ready to die to self in order to help bring new life in our building of the kingdom of God, whatever that may look like? Are we ready to let go of our old ways of thinking in order to allow God's vision to permeate our hearts and minds?

The season of Lent is behind us. He is risen, bringing new life and new hope to us all. Let us grow in the fruits of the Spirit, and let us be ready to take some risks for Jesus after all he took the cross for us!! God Bless

Dementia news

Some news about Churches Together in Cumbria's county wide initiative to make all churches in Cumbria Dementia Friendly by 2020. A group of Dementia Enablers in Barrow have decided to follow the lead of other areas in Cumbria and organise a monthly 'Tea Service'.

A Tea Service is a short, simple, interdenominational act of worship, followed by biscuits, cake, tea, coffee and fellowship. It will be open to anyone, but will be particularly suitable for people who find full length services difficult to deal with, and their carers. Yvonne Povey, Cumbria Dementia Project Officer, Churches Together in Barrow and Dalton, and Barrow Mission Community are supporting this work. After visiting a number of venues it was decided that Holy Family Church hall (Ostley Bank, off Harrel Lane, LA13 9LR) would be the most suitable. It has parking available, and is not far from a stop on the number 3 bus route. The Tea Service is likely to be once a month on a Monday afternoon.

To make this work, help from churches is needed. We need your prayers for this work; we need people to bake cakes, help with transport, give time at the services welcoming and talking to people; we need money to buy resources such as special hymn books, printing publicity material, refreshments, etc. Your time commitment doesn't need to be for every month. If you could commit to two or three services a year that would be most welcome.

All in a Good Cause

Furness Homeless Support Group

We at Beacon Hill Church became acquainted with the homeless shelter some years ago, when we took along produce from our Harvest Festival. We were met by an enthusiastic group of people who helped us to unload the car, along with their pet cat! It was a joy to meet them and rather a humbling experience. We continue to take the Harvest produce each year. Also some people take clothing, food and gifts of money. The FHS Group began life in 1989 as a one-off Christmas Shelter offering food, warmth and shelter during the Festive Season. However, the need for this provision all year round soon became evident. In 1991 a day centre was opened, using a port-a-cabin (once used by the dog warden!). Pat Chapples, now the manager, and her late Mum worked tirelessly, raising funds by "car booting". In 1995 the National Lottery helped to buy 27 Bath Street.

From humble beginnings run entirely by volunteers, FHSG now owns 5 properties and employs 9 qualified and experienced staff. There are 9 single rooms, a ground floor flat, a 2 bed house and a 3 bed house. The day centre, the Christmas shelter and the charity shop all continue. A team of volunteers give their time each week, totalling 4,000 hours a year.

FSHG are grateful for the help of the local community, without which they would not be able to provide this level of service.



Do come to support the choir and hear in song and drama about the amazing happenings at that first Pentecost.


