In the summer of 1979, 'Reasons To Be Cheerful, Part 3' by Ian Dury and the Blockheads reached number 3 in the UK singles charts. It popped back into my mind recently on reading a newspaper article bemoaning the levels of pessimism and negativity around today, brought on by concerns about alarming world events and leaders seemingly motivated by ego and self interest rather than service. The article encouraged individuals to focus instead on optimism and positivity. In the song, Ian Dury counted the things in life that made him cheerful, a random list including the

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Hammersmith Palais, yellow socks, Cheddar cheese and pickle and summer. Maybe next time we feel a bit down in the dumps, we could try making our own 'count your blessings' list. Our version, not being a song, wouldn't even have to rhyme.

As Christians, we have every reason to be cheerful. We know unequivocally that we are loved. We know that God loves us so much that he was willing to sacrifice his only son to save us. We know that, in accepting his love, we will always be forgiven, no matter how much we fail to live up to expectations. This is truly amazing, the biggest of big deals, and it is on offer to everyone. For many millions of people over 2,000 years, it has been, quite literally, life changing.

As mere human beings, though, we can't always live at such an elevated level; we also crave the down-to-earth blessings of the 'yellow socks' variety. However, even in the small things, we can still see God. This year, we have been deprived of a

typical British summer and have instead enjoyed weeks of lovely sunshine. How much easier it is to admire the beauty of God's creation when the roses in your garden are the best they've ever been! Ignore for the moment that the lawn is a bit brown and that we are probably only getting this summer courtesy of global warming: we are privileged to live in a very green and pleasant land. (N.B. I'm writing this in July. August may, of course, have been quite different!)

The story of the Thai boys captured everyone's attention this summer, with people around the world praying for a miracle. We know that, mercifully, all of the boys and their coach got out alive; and we admire the quiet valour of the anonymous heroes who made it happen. Divers and medics from other countries, including our own, worked tirelessly with Thai Navy Seals to locate the boys, keep them supplied with food, medicine and oxygen, at great risk to themselves, then brought them all to safety. One brave Navy diver lost his life, delivering oxygen to the boys, but not keeping enough for himself. They didn't do this for glory or fame, but because they sincerely wanted to help and to use their skills for the good of others. What is this if not love?

Having spent most of my life in education, September has always felt to me like the real start of the year. Likewise, in church, we look forward to what the new year might bring. This September gives us another reason to be cheerful - we welcome our new minister, Zena Smith, as she begins her life in ministry in South West Cumbria. We are privileged to walk beside her at this exciting time, and we extend to her a warm and loving United Area welcome.

## 1,000 Letters

3Generate, the Methodist Children and Youth Assembly, will be held in Southport from 23<sup>rd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> November. The organisers would like to receive 1,000 letters from congregation members to encourage the 1,000 children and young people who are expected to attend. They have given the following guidance for letter writers: "The purpose of the letter is to help children and young people feel connected to, and part of, the wider body of the Church; to feel part of the big Methodist family!

### Who is the letter for?

- The letter you write will be displayed at 3Generate to be read by a number of children and young people.
- The children and young people at 3Generate will be in the age bracket of 8-23. If your letter is written particularly for younger children, or the older attendees, then please make a note of that when you post it to us. Otherwise, you can write a general letter aimed at all ages.

### What to include:

- something of your faith story you won't necessarily have space to include all of it, but you may think that there are parts that would be interesting for the children and young people to hear about.
- something about your experiences of being part of a church/faith community. Maybe you were part of a church when you were younger could you share some of that story?
- things you have learned again you won't be able to include everything, but are there key things you have learned about life and faith that would be helpful to share?
- encouragement for the younger generation to be courageous in their faith.
- Please make sure that the language you use and the stories you refer to are appropriate for the age group.

## How to write it:

- A handwritten letter is more personal, so if it is possible for you, please do write by hand, but if you need to type it that's fine too!
- please don't put your address, or any personal contact details, on the letter.
- please don't put your surname on the letter; simply sign it with your first name.

## How long should it be?

• Ideally your letter should be one side of A4.

## **Community Outreach Group**

An extract from the minutes of the COG meeting held at Dalton Community Church, Market Street on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> June:

Treasurer's Report: Balance £794.92.

**Network:** Easter Offering Service was poorly attended - Praise Group swelled the numbers. £564.65 was collected from envelopes and at the service, an increase from last year's total of £524.47.

**Christian Aid Week:** Trinity collected over £1,400 from a special service and door to door collection.

**Mission Community Report:** Progress slow in many areas, due to change of Anglican clergy. Jennet to meet with Rev Ruth Crossley to discuss ways forward. Awaiting new Bishop of Penrith in April next year.

Family and community worker: The Area Trustees are considering grants to extend Sophie Carnaby's appointment for a further 2 years. There will be no cost to individual churches.

**Children's Work:** Flashbacks was run successfully again at Ramsden Street with 2 Barrow schools attending.

Messy Church at Trinity has 30 - 40 attending (often with no Church connection).

Messy Church at Hartington Street has finished for summer.

Bible Society had a tent at Dalton Carnival, with an Egyptian theme.

Askam Village School children's choir will visit Duddon Road Church to perform a Harvest themed service on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> October at 2:00 pm.

The Bible Stories Exhibition at Trinity was visited by over 400 children.

Greengate Street School invited Trinity members to visit their school after the exhibition, which reaches children from non-Christian households.

Kirkby church will welcome the Brownie pack to use their Church Hall.

They have moved from Grizebeck Community Centre.

Guides at Trinity are putting on a picnic lunch.

Dalton are trying hard to get Scouts to their services.

Vickerstown has good contact with uniformed groups, through Karen Edmondson and Geoff Pugh who are Cub and Scout leaders.

## You, me and afternoon tea spin offs:

Dalton continues weekly, led by four people, but they struggle with transport if some of the team leaders are missing. They have a short time of exercise and then entertainment. The club has received a grant from Hornby Trust and CVS.

Askam Exercise Class continues with a loyal group.

Beacon Hill Monday Magic has received a grant from Cumberland Building Society, which will pay for a coach and part of the admission charge to Levens Hall in July.

Trinity runs a club which uses music in quizzes for their 70's and 80's group.


**Big Event:** Jennet is exploring the cost of a United Area weekend away or a holiday in 2019.

## **Youth Spot**

Over 50 Cubs from 4 packs across Barrow, including most of Walney's two groups (half of the total) and several from Beacon Hill, enjoyed a District Camp over the weekend of 13th-15th July at Great Tower on Windermere. It was lovely not to have to worry about rain, though the canoeing option on the activities list still led to many of the Cubs getting very wet! Whilst some missed their video games a little, all of them got stuck in to the camp atmosphere with songs round the campfire on the first evening and several wide games (a term describing anything that involves running round outdoors, usually in teams, trying to complete a task or build up a higher score than others) across the course of the weekend as well as the two sessions of activities run by the resident staff at Great Tower using their facilities. These included bouldering, crate stacking, archery, the gauntlet - a sort of vertical obstacle course - and the 'leap of faith' which involved climbing to a tree platform then jumping for a trapeze (or being lowered back down again for those who found it a bit too high). We also walked up to Tower Rock, the highest point on the site, to sketch the view and on the Sunday had a bug hunt amongst the trees, grass and bracken: the planned pond dipping had to be skipped as the pond had dried up! It's likely that all of the children tried something new at some point, as well as sleeping in tents and meeting new friends from other groups, and spending the great majority of the time outdoors. They were certainly more tired on the second night than the first, allowing the leaders a full 7 hours in bed which was about twice as long as the Friday night! It is a great experience for the Cubs and we hope to continue providing these opportunities.
