



Life has an annoying habit of not turning out quite the way we anticipated it or planned it to be. And sometimes the things that hit us are so overwhelming that we feel in danger of drowning, swept along by events that are simply out of our control. Redundancy, sickness, bereavement, the breakdown of a key relationship and similarly significant experiences affecting us personally or someone close to us can turn our worlds upside down. How, as Christians, do we respond? Well the simple answer is - like any other human being! The problem for us sometimes, though, is that we THINK we should be able to float

through such events on a tide of trust and confidence in God. When we find ourselves in a dark place where it seems God has deserted us or we just can't seem to call on those reserves of trust, perhaps to the extent that we don't even feel able to pray as we normally can, then we feel we've somehow failed God - and we pile a whole heap of guilt on top of whatever has already brought us to this place. A friend of mine once asked me to lead a church study group on 'What it means to be bereaved' because when his mother passed away he hadn't felt able admit to his church or even to himself his true feelings of desolation, anger and grief since he felt he should have been joyful that she 'had gone to that better place'. Two aspects of scripture have helped me through such experiences. The psalms are often wonderful examples of people of faith struggling with the 'valleys of the shadow'. Learn from them that it's alright to rage at God, to feel God's absence or to have a sense that we've somehow lost our faith.

Above all, God wants us to be open and honest - after all, which good parent wants their child to hide from them their true feelings when they are struggling? Even Jesus, in Gethsemane and on the cross, had his moments of doubt and despair. And secondly, we can also learn from the psalms and from Christ himself that giving vent to our true feelings allows God to break through our pain and despair, perhaps reawakening memories of previous storms we've weathered when God has brought us back into the sunlight or enabling us to find peace even in the midst of the darkness. That's why in Psalm 42 the writer can begin in a dark place, expressing a longing for a renewed sense of God's presence and end with the words: 'Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God, for I shall again praise him, my help and my God.'

United Area Meeting

The United Area Annual General Meeting will be held on Wednesday 25th September at 7 pm at Beacon Hill. Each church has at least two representatives and each committee has at least one representative. Please could all members of the Area meeting (or, for churches, the agreed substitutes if necessary) come to share in the planning of the life and witness of our United Area.

Christian Aid project

Thank you to Dalton Christian Women's Fellowship for their donation to the project to help children in Kenya affected by HIV and AIDS. Our total is now £3198.05.

Our target is ± 5000 , which we aim to reach by June 2020. We have already raised $\pm 10,000$ for 2 Christian Aid projects, one for work with women in Afghanistan and the other for a maternal and child health project in Kenya. This is a wonderful achievement, and when we reach our target for the current project we will be responsible for raising an amazing sum of money, as the project is part-funded by USAID, who will give ± 17 for every ± 1 raised.

We have recently received a report giving details of the work done on this project for the year ending May 2019. Extracts will be published in Newslink over the next few months.

Objective 1: Improved access to health, education and social services for vulnerable <u>children/orphans and their families</u>

92,176 vulnerable children and orphans received health and nutrition support.

HIV Prevention and Treatment

The project screened 12,730 children for HIV risk, out of whom 10,101 were eligible for testing. 4,434 children were tested for HIV.

Support for those affected by HIV

120 support group sessions were held at health facilities, reaching 3,689 children living with HIV. The sessions were planned to coincide with children's clinic appointments, during which they had their drugs replenished and had monitoring tests done. Children were able to express their own concerns, which included: not taking their HIV medication at the same time every day as they lacked clocks/watches; unfavourable school schedules; and lack of pill carriers so that some children had to take the entire pack to school. As a result of this feedback, 50 children were given pill carriers to protect their medication. Stigma and discrimination from peers, non-supportive caregivers, non-reported drug reactions to the clinicians and improper drug storage were also discussed.

Nutrition and sanitation counselling

10,483 parents and carers learnt about adequate nutrition, the importance of a balanced diet, appropriate food preparation and storage, kitchen gardening skills, and chicken rearing. Nutritional counselling is important because HIV treatment drugs are very strong and can make those who need them very ill when taken without adequate food.

5,141 vulnerable children and orphans were assessed during home visits, of whom 67 were found to be moderately malnourished and referred to health facilities. An additional 86 were referred to church groups to get relief food.

Provision of child protection services

Age appropriate messages on child protection were passed on to 33,821 children during age appropriate forums. Children learnt about their right to dignity and how to raise the alarm in case of abuse. Within the reporting period, 17 cases of child abuse and neglect were reported to the relevant authorities and are being followed-up to ensure completion.

2,657 children were supported to acquire birth certificates, bringing the cumulative total to

76,700 children who now have them. Obtaining a birth certificate will help children to exercise their right to basic services such as health and justice.

Toilet Twinning

The Food & Fellowship group at Vickerstown meets about once a month. The initial idea was simply to share a meal and time together with a voluntary donation covering the cost of the food but we quickly found that we were making a profit so had to decide what to do with it! We have supported various projects over the years, but the very first thing we did was to 'twin' both of our building's toilets - if you have ever paid a visit whilst visiting us you may have noticed the certificates on display. 'Our' toilets are both in Burundi (I confess I've never looked up the exact grid references, which are supplied along with a picture) but the scheme covers many countries where there is a need to provide basic toilets for family or community use. There may be more than one similar scheme, but the main one - and the one we used - is a partnership between Cord and Tearfund, both Christian organisations. For £60 the latrine is built, and communities receive hygiene education to encourage its correct use. £60 is an average: depending on conditions the materials and building work may cost more or less than this, and sometimes people will source their own materials and build their own latrines when an education programme has done a good enough job of explaining why they are needed. Projects supported by toilet twinning donations also help to provide clean water, preventing avoidable disease. The website estimates that 2.3 billion people worldwide still don't have somewhere safe to go to the toilet: as well as poor hygiene this can also leave women in particular vulnerable to being attacked when finding a place in the open, especially at night. A current focus of their work is providing sanitation for Rohingya refugees from Myanmar (Burma), living in huge camps in Bangladesh with few facilities. If your church toilets, or even your own toilet at home, are feeling a bit lonely at present, why not consider twinning them? Find out more at www.toilettwinning.org, which also has resources for schools, youth groups and uniformed organisations as well as churches.
