Today's Readings: Colossians 1:15-23 Colossians 3: 1-4

Reflection:

Traditionally the secular world has welcomed the New Year with parties and often a fair amount of alcohol with regards to drinking toasts. The current restrictions have of course prevented the gatherings we would normally expect and it may well be that we all have more time to reflect on the past year and how we would like the New Year to be. Since the time of Wesley Methodist people have been encouraged to see the arrival of a New Year as a time to reflect on their personal life and in particular their individual relationship with God. The annual Covenant Service and the New Year's Eve Watchnight Service were both opportunities to take stock and make a solemn commitment to endeavour to walk daily with Jesus Christ.

In his letter to the Colossians Paul challenges the members of the young church to look very carefully at themselves and in particular their commitment to Jesus Christ. In Colossians 1:15-20 he reminds them of who Jesus Christ is...."the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation....." who reconciles us to God. Paul reminds these young Christians that it is Christ by his death on the cross and his resurrection who has freed them from their sins and he urges them to lead holy lives as people who have died to their former life and risen to new life in Christ.

In this context he gives clear advice on how they might do it. In chapter 3 he urges them to do two things....1."set your hearts on things above,



Amen

where Christ is seated at the right hand of God.(and)

2. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things."

When Paul is using the word set it is very much in the sense of a compass bearing that we should get our direction for the journey in such a way that there is no chance of deviation.

It is also important to note that both the heart and mind are regarded as being of equal importance.

Some people may believe that a commitment to Christianity is an intellectual choice and knowledge of the scriptures is paramount. Indeed John Wesley spent the early years of his Christian journey in that frame of mind: on the otherhand others believe that an emotional experience is the most important thing to have in a relationship with God. Paul however stresses both the heart and the mind.

In Wesley's case it wasn't until he felt his heart strangely warmed that he was able to say. "I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

As we enter a New Year I would invite you to take time for serious reflection with regards your Christian journey in 2021, to set your compass bearing so that both your heart and mind are firmly fixed on "things above".

Prayer: Our Father and our God, as we stand at the beginning of this New Year we confess our need of Your presence and Your guidance as we face the future.

We each have our hopes and expectations for the year that is ahead of us—but You alone know what it holds for us, and only You can give us the strength and the wisdom we will need to meet its challenges. So help us to humbly put our hands into Your hand, and to trust You and to seek Your will for our lives during this coming year. In the midst of life's uncertainties in the days ahead, assure us of the certainty of Your unchanging love.

In the midst of life's inevitable disappointments and heartaches, help us to turn to You for the stability and comfort we will need.

In the midst of life's temptations and the pull of our stubborn self-will, help us not to lose our way but to have the courage to do what is right in Your sight, regardless of the cost. We pray this in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Today's Readings:

Genesis 1:1-5; Mark 1:4-11

Reflection:

Today we read two passages from the bible which we probably are all pretty familiar with and we might wonder what the connection is between God creating the world and John the Baptist in the wilderness. Well, when I read both passages back-to-back I am reminded of God speaking our world into creation and of John the Baptist also speaking Jesus Christ into creation. Of course, when the world first to get to hear about Jesus he is a tiny baby being born in a stable, but then this special baby disappears. The people of the day didn't have the internet or even a reliable postal service, they would not have known anything more about Jesus as he grew up. And to this end,

we have very little information about the child-Jesus in Scripture. But today we meet John the Baptist. A Godly man for sure, he had taken himself out to the wilderness to get closer to God. We too have seen more modern-day people cultivating a life like this, in fact the forefathers and foremothers of Christianity often took themselves off into isolation into the wilderness to live a life of servitude dedicated to God. And here John the Baptist appears, emerging from the wilderness just as had been prophesied; to call on people to repent and be baptised. These actions represented a physical change in the doers lives; by repenting and being baptised they were choosing to give up their sinful and sin-filled lives and their selfish ways and were turning to the God of creation who calls us all to him, with outstretched arms. And when we too turn back to God, each and every time we do so when we have slipped into sin, God looks at us and utters those words of creation, that we are 'very good.' But more importantly John the Baptist's job was to call out to all and sundry, that one greater than him was coming, the Messiah was here! And so, what can we take from these passages today? Well, I suspect there is a message for us about witnessing to the truth of a life dedicated to Jesus; a message that the things we do or refrain from doing, say or refrain from saying herald to others the benefits of living in as Christ-like a way as possible. Like John the Baptist, each one of us is called to prepare the way for Jesus to touch others lives. Amen.

God of creation, we know we all only still see you through a dark glass dimly, and our perspectives on the world are similarly discoloured by all that gets in the way of your truth.

shine your light through every ideology, cultural norm or worldview held by your people

Today's Readings: 1 Samuel 3 1-10 John 1 43-51 Reflection:

My World's Bible Dictionary student edition tells me about Samuel. It tells me that Samuel was a Levite. He was born in Ramah, in the tribal territory of Ephraim. Samuel's mother made a promise before he was born to take him to the tabernacle. Here she dedicated him to God for life-long service. And so he stayed at the tabernacle when his parents returned home. Samuel was then bought up by the priest Eli. He grew up to become his helper in the duties of the tabernacle.

The commentary which I read says this about where Samuel slept. He slept close by to Eli the high priest who was accustomed to being called during the night. Samuel was certain that Eli had called him each time he was nudged by God. It took Eli three times to realise what was happening. The third time Samuel came to him Eli told the boy to go back to bed and reply to what he was told. God on the third time stood before Samuel and called him again by his name. And this time Samuel answered, "Speak. I'm your servant, ready to listen."

Do you remember when you were called by God?

I always went to church, I grew up with the stories of the Bible and the parables of Jesus. I don't remember much about the Epistles, but I suppose we were taught about them. This is one of my favourite Old Testament stories of how a young boy was nudged out of bed to be summoned by God.

The New Testament reading for today in John's Gospel about the calling of the first disciples. As I read it conjures up in my mind a lovely picture of how Jesus calls ordinary, everyday folk to be his Followers. I did a bit of research here and found out that Jesus travelled to Galilee where he found Philip and Jesus told Philip quite simply just to follow him . Phillip came from Bethsaida where Andrew and Peter came from. Jesus was definitely building up his crew.

"Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph'". Nathanael said to him, "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see."

A few years ago now I saw The Furness Choir sing "While shepherds watch" by Roger Jones. In the musical is a song called "Come and see the beauty of the King. " The first three words of the song are those spoken by Philip to Nathaniel come and see. In other words he told Nathaniel to stop asking questions and Just come and meet him... come see the beauty of the king, the Lord of everything.

And so I ask you today have you met him, the one who can change your life? Come and see what he did for all mankind. Amen.

Reflection

Not too long ago, on leaving school or university many people would find a job and expect to be with that company or organisation until they retired. Not so today. I read somewhere that young people entering employment now can expect to have to find a different career path as many as seven times during their working life as the world of work is in a constant state of shift and change. As a result, they will have to fill in many application forms and when you're applying for a job you haven't done before, the key is to identify the 'transferable skills' which you've gained in one field of work that would equip you to be employed in another sphere.

It might seem to you that Jesus made a strange choice for his first disciples as he calls this little group of fishermen to leave their nets and follow him. Surely there would have been others better equipped for the task? Yet when you think about it, fishermen would have had many skills that were 'transferable' to life as followers of this Jesus who would wander the land without thought for comfort, disrupting, disturbing and challenging everywhere he went. He – and they – would be met with misunderstanding, suspicion and opposition whilst also bringing healing and acceptance to many who would have felt themselves to be hopeless and helpless. Fishermen needed patience, the ability to spend hours in the rain, the sun, the wind. They needed powers of observation to read the movement of the wind and the sea to spot the storms



approaching or the shoals of fish below the waves. They needed gentleness to feel the fish take the bait and strength to play the line or land a bulging net. Sharing God's message also demands patience and endurance, sensitivity to other people and their particular needs and careful attention to the right ways of bringing them in to the presence of Jesus. No wonder Jesus spoke about them becoming 'fishers of people'.

So I wonder what 'transferable skills' you might have gained in life that Jesus can use in the building of his kingdom here on earth? You will almost certainly have developed skills and gifts without even realising it, simply through your life experiences, whether in paid employment, unemployment or in caring for a home and family, in facing illness or tragedy, disappointment or frustration as well as in the joyful moments of life. Pray that God will help you see how you can use the personal resources he's given you to share the good news of Jesus Christ in word and action. Amen

Today's Readings: 1 Corinthians 9: 16-23, Mark 1: 21 – 28

Reflection: At first, it would appear that Mark is giving us another summary of Jesus' ministry However, the focal point is not just Jesus' teaching, but his act of healing and deliverance. Jesus does not come with a message alone, but with the power to change lives. His words and deeds are linked, clear signs of the presence of God's kingdom and of Jesus' identity as God's son. The crowds recognise this. In the beginning, they are astounded at his teaching, but by the end they recognise his authority over unclean spirits. The unclean spirits also recognise and confess Jesus' true identity. Jesus commands the spirit to be silent. This repeated command suggests that Jesus wants to work quietly, without drawing attention to the fact that he is

the son of God (possibly to prevent misunderstanding?) For Mark, the real sign of Jesus' identity as son of God is his suffering and death. Jesus' ministry had begun. He had been baptised, and had called disciples. Jesus did not go to an unfamiliar place, but started from the place he knew, the Synagogue. He offered new insight and understanding of his own tradition, and people were astounded. But this did not bring harmony but discord. The man with an unclean spirit caused a disturbance. Jesus brought healing and people were amazed. Imagine hearing something very familiar but someone adds a new twist, a deeper insight, revealing something not seen before. Imagine this person working for healing and wholeness in front of you. 'What is this?' the people of the synagogue asked. Their encounter with Jesus provoked a reaction. Indifference was not on the agenda. Do people still react to Jesus in the same way today? Does God confront us in Jesus? The community for whom Mark wrote would have understood Jesus' teaching and authority through his death. It pointed to his identity as son of God, revealed by his integrity. Jesus didn't change his teaching to fit, he didn't back off from healing and empowering others, and eventually he was crucified. We can recognise that Jesus is the 'holy one of God' but is it possible to feel astonishment like the people in the synagogue? Do we allow ourselves to be 'wowed' by Jesus? We get a glimpse through the lives of those who live firmly in the path of Jesus. Do we know people who display such integrity? How can we follow Jesus and amaze and astonish? How can we walk the path of integrity in our everyday lives? Jesus started in a familiar place. Maybe this is our starting place too. Jesus' fame spread after this incident. Some are called to tasks that ensure fame or notoriety, but others are to stay and serve God where they are. What might this mean for me? What risks might I have to take? Or, as a Church what might this creativity in causing a bit of a stir for Jesus? What have we got to offer in the light of our experiences over

the last twelve months in particular? As we reflect, we may recognise our own starting place, and allow Jesus to lead us, and 'wow' us. **Amen.**
