Hello!

I'm writing to you from my home in Barrow in Furness after two years of living away studying Theology, Ministry and Mission at The Queen's Foundation in Birmingham. It's great to be back in Cumbria and lovely to be able to live with my husband, Simon, full time again. I'm excited to be joining the South West Cumbria United Area staff team as a Minister from 1st September 2023. I'm looking forward to serving God in a new way and to walking alongside you all as we continue to deepen and strengthen our faith and serve our community. My full-time ministry role is split between the United Area and the South Lakes Methodist Circuit so I'll work half of the week in the United Area and half of the week in the South Lakes Circuit. This means that I will normally only be on the preaching plan in the United Area every other week as I will also preach in the South Lakes Circuit.

Not only is September a new start for me as I start a new role in the church but it's also the start of a new year in the Methodist Church. At the annual Methodist Conference held in June 2023 the incoming President, Rev'd Gill Newton, and Vice President, Deacon Kerry Scarlett, introduced the theme for the 2023/2024 year as Hidden Treasures. The aim of this theme is to encourage us to look for and find the treasures of God in unexpected places, unexpected people and in difficult times. Finding these hidden treasures may help us to discern God's desire for the Church and to identify the potential in each of us and in our churches to grow and work for God. The annual Methodist Prayer Handbook for 2023/2024 aims to help us to explore this theme individually and collectively throughout the year. If you haven't tried following the prayer handbook for your daily devotions yet, I'd encourage you to give it a try. I've found it really helpful especially on those days when I can't find the words to pray.

As I rejoin the United Area I pray that God will guide our work together and help us to discover and develop the hidden treasures in our churches and in the communities in which we live and worship. I look forward to being with you again and to supporting you in a new way as I work to serve God in this area. With prayers,

REFLECTION

Placing the spotlight on Exodus 3:14 I AM WHO I AM

In terms of The Times most popular baby names of 2023 I doubt if I AM will reach the top ten; however, there is an awful lot packed into these three letters. The scene is a conversation between God and Moses. God has selected Moses to lead the Israelites out of captivity in Egypt. Moses is not too enthusiastic about the idea, but God persists until Moses tacitly agrees and asks God, "Who shall I say has sent me?" and God replies I AM. In essence God is revealing that he is the living God who always was, always is and always will be. God reveals his identity to Moses to give him confidence and of course we know the end of the story – that Moses did lead God's chosen people to the promised land.

The story however didn't end there. There was more to come. God's chosen people did fall into sin yet again and forgot God, but God in his great love didn't forget them. Fast forward to the New Testament and we hear Jesus in John's gospel revealing to his followers a series of seven metaphors each beginning I am - I am the bread of life; I am the true vine; I am the light of the world etc.

Any God-fearing Jew would immediately recall God's word to Moses and make the link but so there is no doubt in their minds Jesus in John 8:58 says, "before Abraham (the father of the nation) was born I am." Quite simply Jesus is saying in no uncertain terms that he is God.

In a multi-faith, post-Christian western culture it is easy to be influenced by the more superficial claims that Jesus was a good teacher, a great role model or a fantastic storyteller whose example of selflessness is unparalleled in this world and of course those statements describe him well, but they do not identify him. The Bible leaves us in no doubt that Jesus is I AM. He has always been, he always is, and he promises to always be.

At the heart of the Christian gospel is the invitation for each one of us to have a personal relationship with him. Three thousand years ago Moses hesitatingly took God at his word when he identified himself as I AM. Two thousand years ago God fully revealed himself in the person of Jesus who unequivocally identified himself as I AM and his followers had their lives transformed. Today he still invites people to have their lives transformed by identifying with him and walking every succeeding day with him as an integral part of their life.

CHAPTER AND VERSE

Proverbs 3:5,6

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight."

Part of the challenge of the Christian life, is to walk with Christ on a daily basis in all that we say, think and do. On the face of it, this doesn't sound too difficult, but the reality is often harder than we expect. The modern day world in which we live, means that we can control almost every aspect of our lives. We live in a 'what you want, when you want it' culture where immediate gratification (and with it short term fulfilment) is always on offer, making the idea of putting your trust in God, an all-knowing, yet intangible being, a challenging concept today.

There are several things to consider in this proverb: **'Trust'** is of course the first word to think about, closely followed by **'all'** (your heart). Who else, but God, could you do this with? Secondly, learning to lean **'not'** on your own understanding, but to put your faith in a higher being is an integral part of being a follower of Christ. And finally, to **'acknowledge'** God in everything that you do – that is to accept the existence of God in your life and live it out in your words, thoughts and actions. While verse 5 is better known, verse 6 throws down the gauntlet and reminds us to be Christlike and live our lives in a manner that is becoming of God himself.

The proverb is advice given by Solomon to his son. In a dream, God asked him what he wanted most, and Solomon replied, "an understanding mind . . . able to discern between good and evil" (I Kings 3:9). Solomon's wisdom was a quality bestowed upon him by God. We could do worse than follow Solomon's example of where our sense of judgement and compassion comes from.


Their work includes:

Earlier in the year the Anna Chaplaincy Barrow team organised a Holiday at Home event, which took place over 4 days at 4 different churches.

This was an ambitious undertaking, which could not have taken place without a great deal of work by the ecumenical organising team and members of the host churches: St Paul's Church of England, Emmanuel Community Church, Holy Family Roman Catholic Church and Spring Mount independent church.

The aim was to provide company and enjoyment for people who lived alone and were unlikely to have a holiday.

A wide range of activities was arranged for those attending, including:

Card-making and watching classic comedy film clips

Chair-based exercises, hand massage, nail painting and table-top games

A presentation on Barrow in the past, singing by schoolchildren and a demonstration of Indian dancing Making party hats and mocktails in preparation for a final afternoon party, with 60s style food and a singalong session

Worship and 'thoughts for the day'

These events were thoroughly enjoyed by guests and volunteers alike, as shown in this selection from the comments received:

"A great day had by all. Lovely food and good company, with singing and a bit of dancing at Spring Mount."

"It was a brilliant day at Holy Family, because of the children's singing and all the helpful children. And finding out that you could visit the archives at the library."

"Had a great day! After Chair Exercise and a lovely lunch in the afternoon we had hand massage and nails done. It was a lovely day!"

"Was quite nervous at first but once I was sat around everyone I instantly felt calm and loved talking to different people. I felt part of a family."

All our United Area churches are encouraged to care for the planet which God has entrusted to us and to work towards becoming Eco churches.

The first step is to take the Eco Survey, which has 5 sections: Worship and Teaching, Buildings, Land, Community and Global Engagement, and Lifestyle.

Congratulations to Ramsden Street, who have gained a bronze award. Here they tell us how they achieved this:

Ramsden Street United Reformed Church are now officially on our eco journey and would like to thank everyone who has supported us and contributed to this. A special thank you to Kate for her encouragement and help in submitting our eco church application form to A Rocha UK. The form was all completed online and we are now proud to have achieved our bronze award. The certificate is on display in our community room.

A coffee morning was held on the 16th June to finish planting our planters and put up some bunting to celebrate our success. Our courtyard now has a planter and hanging baskets (thank you Nigel and Reg), a bird house and feeder and a bug hotel, to see if we can encourage the wildlife in our area. This has all helped towards our award. As we live in an urban area we do not have any green space, but we have used the outdoor space we have to try to encourage bugs, birds and butterflies and all the plants are planted in peat free compost.

We have made some changes indoors too; we use eco-friendly cleaning products and as we always have, we continue to recycle. Our electricity is from 100% green energy. Our tea, coffee and sugar are all Fairtrade.

We remember to worship and pray too for our environment and try to be good custodians of this wonderful world in which we live, that God gave us.

We think also of our neighbours around the world, who often live in poverty and experience the most negative impact of climate change despite this being caused by more wealthy nations.

Our journey has begun and will continue as we explore more environmentally friendly, energy saving options for our building ... silver award next!

FOCUS ON VICKERSTOWN METHODIST CHURCH



This is a good time to focus on Vickerstown, as we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the formal opening of our 'new' building on June 13th this year. The current church building stands on roughly the same land footprint as the old wooden Sunday school hut, at the end of Warren Street on the left. The original church building was built around the same time as much of the original housing on Vickerstown, developed as accommodation for the workers of the shipyard (then owned by Vickers) in the very early 1900s. There has been a worshipping Methodist community on the site since 1905, so we also had centenary celebrations in 2005 marked with an exhibition, a concert from the British Methodist Youth Choir and a very large cake! When the much larger old building became too

expensive to heat and maintain, developing dry rot among other problems, it was sold and the current building was developed next door – much easier to look after, considerably warmer and more flexible in its use, as well as much better suited to the current size of congregation (averaging out at around 12-14 on a Sunday morning). A block of 6 flats now stands where the old building was, retaining the old church tower facing onto the Promenade and an overall resemblance to the architecture of the original church, as it is in a conservation area. The current building is less visible, separated from the Promenade by a steep banking and our lovely garden, so we have installed a large wooden cross, sign and noticeboard on the banking so the church's presence can be seen from the Promenade. We try to keep the vegetation on the bank under control, though getting at it is a challenge!

Having the outside area, as well as a view over the channel from the large windows all down that side of the main room, was part of our motivation for joining the Eco-Congregation scheme (now Eco-Church) in its fairly early stages. We have held an award since 2010, though we still sit at Bronze level – as other churches in the Area catch us up, perhaps this will spur us on towards a Silver award. The garden allows us to host the Area Bonfire and to join in with national efforts like the Garden Birdwatch and Big Butterfly Count; it is also used by our Uniformed Organisations at times and people are always drawn to the windows to look out: a lovely list of birds they had spotted during the day was left for us once by polling station staff after a particularly quiet election day! All the flowers and greenery for this lovely Easter Cross from 2021 came from our own garden and pictures of various flowers as the seasons passed featured in printed updates to the congregation sent out during Covid



lockdowns. We also like to use tubs and hanging baskets to brighten up the street side of the church.



Vickerstown is a Fairtrade Church, a status we renewed during this year's Fairtrade Fortnight, with a stall at every coffee morning, Fairtrade tea, coffee and sugar in the kitchen and an additional focus at one coffee morning every year – in 2022 we even had the Mayor of Barrow with us (in red at the back, in front of the range of Fairtrade Easter eggs we had from Re:new).

We hold coffee mornings roughly once a month, Food & Fellowship gatherings every other month – on the even-numbered months, so we can have pancakes in February! – and Bible Study once a fortnight. It has been good to welcome a few new members over the last year or two.

The church prayer group meets in members' homes every other week and leads our service twice a quarter — which is very much appreciated. Rainbows and Brownies meet weekly in term time, and the building serves as the local polling station and also as a children's party venue on a regular basis. We would love to see the premises used more during the week and by the community.



FROM OUR CHURCHES

Trinity

Our monthly coffee mornings continue, and are enjoyed by all who attend. In May we supported Christian Aid in a number of ways. We had envelopes available in church for people to use, did a little (but very successful) House to House collecting, some less successful deliver only collecting, had an e-envelope, a Just Giving page supporting a sponsored walk, and a social evening with pie and peas, a quiz, and some other fun and games, including two short videos showing why we were raising the money. We raised over £1400 for Christian Aid during May.

Our most exciting news is that we now have an outside noticeboard facing Abbey Rd. The Community Payback Team put it up for us. They were very efficient (in spite of the rain), and we would recommend any church to use their services. We're pleased to have something showing passersby that we're still a functioning congregation, and that they're welcome to come to our services and other activities.

Also in July, at the AGM of the joint Walney Churches Scout group, several of the Beavers and Cubs were presented with their Chief Scout's Bronze and Silver awards, the highest available to their sections and a great achievement representing a lot of effort from the young people and their leaders.


